or clippers may be helpful. Stay an hour or several, as your schedule allows. This event is organized by the Society of St. Andrew and provides

CARITAS 2012

PUMC will be starting off the New Year full speed ahead by hosting CARITAS from Monday, January 2 through Friday, January 6. The CARITAS program has been blessed with filling all of



their slots through April, 2012; but there is a need to host single women during this first short week of the year. For the past several years we have been hosting families, so the need for material donations that our congregation has so generously offered during those years will greatly decrease. I will still continue my mission of "a warm coat that fits and zips" for any guest who does not have one; so a small monetary donation will fill this need. We will also continue with the BINGO games, so GRTC Bus Passes (available at CVS), per-

sonal care items, such as hand & body lotions, and hats, scarves and gloves will also be appreciated. Please watch for the sign-up board to volunteer to provide a dinner, pack lunches, take home a bag of laundry, or be a chaperone for the evening. I know that our congregation will be blessed in providing this desperately needed service for those in need of a hand up in securing permanent housing.

Weekend Food Program

PUMC is asked to participate in the weekend Backpack Meal Program for certain A.M. Davis students. This project began with the Central Virginia Food Bank to fill a nutrition gap for students who do not have food over the weekend. It provides six meals per weekend to students in schools meeting certain needs requirements. Average cost for other organizations to implement this program is about \$12.00 per student per weekend.



Last year, Woodlake UMC provided weekend "backpacks" of food for six balanced meals for 16 students at A.M. Davis. This summer PUMC provided food for meals for the three-day weekends for six summer school students for six weeks for about \$400.00.

This year, the A.M. Davis counselor has identified 45 students who would benefit from this meal program. You may help in this project by committing to providing for one or more students for the remainder of the year or by making donations to the project. Donations may be put in the offering designated for the **Davis Backpack Meal Program** or left in the church office.

Christmas is Coming

We Think About Giving



While year to date giving overall outpaces last year to date, the last couple of months have seen lower receipts and higher than normal expenses, including the unexpected repair of a water line in the parking lot and some plumbing expenses. Attendance one Sunday was severely affected by the hurricane, and giving in September was also down. Despite this, our church provided relief to those affected by the storm, and we are reaching out to the community with God's love as never before. Providence is committed to keeping all of our won-

derful ministries funded, and in order to ensure sufficient operating reserves, it was prudent to defer the most recent apportionment payment. Apportionments help fund the worldwide United Methodist Church, spreading God's love throughout the world. Providence is committed to our apportionment obligations, and through your faithful giving we can fulfill our local and global mission.

There is excitement in the air at Providence UMC. We are inviting the community to dine with us, experience worship with us, play soccer and camp on our grounds, and to share the joy of a relationship with Jesus Christ. As you look at all the exciting work God has given our church to do, I invite you to be a part of it by giving generously to Providence UMC.

Worship Plans Shared With Congregation

At recent congregation-wide meetings, the worship task force shared information about offering two different worship experiences. This goal had been set in January by our church council. The task force, which has been in prayerful discernment for five months, is proposing this plan:

- The purpose of offering two different services is to reach people for Jesus Christ.
 The new service may appeal to people who are unchurched or have not attended recently.
- The 8:45 a.m. service will move to 9:00 a.m. and conclude at 9:45 a.m. beginning March 4, 2012.
- The service will be less formal; more piano, guitars and other instruments and less organ; more participation by the congregation; more use of visuals; more creative; include a wide variety of music.
- The target audience will be families with children and other young people based on demographic information which points to growth in our area. All ages will be welcome and encouraged to attend.
- A fellowship time will be provided before the service.

The task force is taking seriously questions that the congregation has raised during these meetings such as:

 How can we make sure that Sunday School classes have enough time? We continue to examine ways to ensure this priority for our education program.

- What exactly will the new service look like?
 Recently, our "Hurricane Irene" service on
 August 28 and our outdoor services this
 summer are examples of a less formal service. We will be including various elements of this service type in the weeks and
 months ahead.
- How will you evaluate and improve on the service once it starts? There will be a plan to evaluate each week's service, and at periodic intervals to judge effectiveness not only by numbers attending, but also whether participants are inspired to love and serve God.
- Who will plan the service? The pastor, our music director, and a team of church members will meet regularly to plan the service.
- Will the sermon be different? Please pray for Pastor Mary Beth as she tries to figure all this out!
- What will happen to the people who currently attend the 8:45 service? We hope that each person in our congregation will feel at home either at the new service or at the more traditional 11:00 service. We know this will be a big change for all of us and we are seeking God through it.
- If it is such a big change, why are you doing it? The purpose of the church, according to Matthew 28:19, is to make disciples of Jesus Christ. We must find ways to reach those who do not yet know God's amazing grace. It is why we exist.
